

Tired of "disjointed approaches, fragmented interventions, and the tendency to work in silos."




Situation Tables arise from a need to break down silos.




The goal is to help agencies build and sustain multi-sector collaborations.

Comprised of front line workers from various agencies and sectors



Meet weekly or bi-weekly




Share limited information on clients facing elevated levels of risk



Coordinate immediate interventions (within 24-48 hours)



Who do Situation Tables Serve?

People Living with Acutely Elevated Risk:

- Significant community interest at stake;
- Probability of harm occurring;
- Significant intensity of harm; and
- Multidisciplinary nature of elevated risk.



Privacy & Information Sharing

Integrated
Program
Agreement
(IPA)

Internal agency review and referral

Does this situation require a multi-agency response?

• De-identified information shared

• Group determination if situation meets threshold for collaborative response.

Limited identified information shared

• Agencies consult their own records and share relevant limited information.

Intervention Planned

• Lead and supporting agencies meet after the meeting to discuss intervention.
